Dear Blossom:

I enclose a letter from F. A. Binney about a tree house which he has offered the Exposition. Perhaps you remember that he wrote us before about this, on a postal card. Apparently he made some offer to Mr. John C. Olmsted about which we have never heard. If he takes the matter up with you I should tell him that we cannot use this tree house because the plans of the Exposition are as yet too much in their infancy for you to <sup>accept</sup> use such a feature. I suspect what he offers is the idea of making a house by planting eucalyptus trees close together, then when they get up to a certain height training them over to form the roof. It might be an amusing thing for the rodeo but other than that I do not know where we could use it.
