As yet I have not had the honor of your acquaintance but am appealing to you to use your influence in keeping the exposition at the south end of the park. You undoubtedly realize that a park is created for recreation and rest and happiness of the public who are unable to get such elsewhere. It is not the purpose of a park to place buildings in it other than for park purposes and by placing the exposition with its permanent buildings in the middle of the park the wonderful beauties and the purposes of the park are for all time destroyed. It seems unlikely that you as a member of the park board will permit the purposes of your park to be so sacrificed by allowing the exposition to be placed other than at the south end. I beg of you to make every effort in this serious matter.
