I sincerely hope you will use your influence with Floral Club and others to prevent exposition being located in middle of park. It should be kept at the south end. The park is for park purposes, for the recreation, the pleasure, rest and peace of the public. The people cannot get such rest and happiness if they are confronted by the sight of even thought of buildings about them. If they could, we would not have to provide parks, as they could see buildings enough elsewhere. The park was never intended to serve as a beautiful setting for a group of buildings and at the same time sacrifice the purposes for which the park was created.
