After a warm debate, the moderator rewinded his action, and the prospects for the passage of the enabling act, making valid the proposed coalition between Oakland and San Francisco Presbyteries, were made brighter. For a while it had looked as if the proposition would suffer shipwreck.

Another thorn in the side of mem Another thorn in the side of members yesterday was the curtalling of missionary funds by the general board, and the reduction of the missionaries' calaries without a corresponding cut in the earnings of the higher officers. Dr. John Dinsmore of San Jose and others protested against such action by the general board in "discriminating against the men on the line" to the "advantage of the higher ups." Officers of the synod, however, explained that the order had come from the general assembly, and that it was not in their power to do otherwise than

carry out provisions, regretful as it might be.

In his protest, Dr. Dinsmore declared too much money is being spent by "higher ups;" that it cost nearly \$15,000 a year to maintain the office of the western secretary of the board of home missions at St. Louis, an effice he deemed unnecessary. This effice pays \$5,500, a salary to a stenographer and with traveling expenses, costs about \$15,000, he said.

Dr. Dinsmore said no objection is made to the man, Dr. D. P. Fullerton, but that if economy must be practised, a clean cut should be made from top to bottom.


