We got permission from the chief of police in Los Angeles and Riverside to carry a gun as protection, and we have had a regular time. Some nights when we couldn't reach a town we slept in barns and other times a straw stack was good enough. We met quite a few hoboes and tramps, but had no trouble with anyone. We paid for our meals at the farm houses and made the entire distance along the inland route."

After viewing the Exposition and expressing regrets that they could not remain for Dedication Day, the two young women started on their return journey, yesterday, going by the coast route. The young women insist that Los Angeles will send many thousands for Saturday's big program.

FRENCH EXHIBIT AT THE FAIR TO OPEN TOMORROW

Tommasino's Band to Play La Marsellaise; President Davidson, Others to Speak.

The playing of La Marsellaise by Tommasino's Royal Italian band and the raising of the French flag on the California building will attend the opening of the French exhibit at the Exposition, tomorrow afternoon, at 3:20 o'clock.

President G. A. Davidson will make the introductory remarks, and Superintendent of Schools Duncan MacKinnon will deliver the principal address on behalf of the Exposition.

Members of the French exhibit commission to the Exposition are Albert Timmer, secretary, and general manager; Jean Guiffrey, commissioner of fine arts; Henri Guilleme, architect; and the French government, after which the million-dollar Exposition Fair will be open to Exposition visitors.

The Royal Italian band will give an hour's concert in the quadrangle of the California building.

Five thousand of these souvenirs were received yesterday by Director of Consessions B. W. Lee, and will be placed on sale today. The price will be fifty cents and they will be sold for admission Saturday afternoon at the same price. To prevent re-sale of these badges by persons leaving the grounds during the day, special guards will be stationed outside the grounds and the public is warned to buy badges of no one after Friday night, except uniformed attendants at Exposition gates.

Almost a thousand of these badges have been sold at Los Angeles, and not until today could a sufficient number be obtained, for sale in the Exposition grounds and other form of admission are good Saturday, as well as any other day, and the badges have been obtained with the idea of making a souvenir along with the privilege of entering the grounds as many times as the holder desires.

Badges may be obtained from O. L. Jeancon, at 241 Broadway, who has charge of their sale.

5000 COPPER MINERS GIVEN WAGE INCREASE

CARDINAL NEAR DEATH; IS GIVEN LAST RITES

By the Associated Press. ROMEO (via Paris), March 13.—Cardinal Gotti, prefect of the propaganda, is gravely ill. He was given the last rites of the church this afternoon.

Cardinal Gotti was given the red in his office for another dash into the propaganda is one of the most influential in the Catholic church. All missionary lands, including some parts of America and Africa, are under the jurisdiction of his office. He was born at Genoa, March 29, 1824.

Last September Cardinal Gotti, while in his office, fainted and fell, his head striking violently against the floor. A slight concussion of the brain followed.

ARCTIC DASH PLANNED BY CAPTAIN SWENSON

NEW YORK, March 13.—Capt. Olof Swenson, who in the fall of 1914 rescued the Karluk survivors after a battle against high seas and Arctic ice floes, will sail from Seattle this week for another dash into the frozen north. It was announced here tonight. Instead of the power schooner King and Wings, in which he battered his way to Wrangel Island, he will take the thirty-ton bark Belvidere. If the plans are carried out, the Belvidere will meet the Stefansson Canadian Arctic expedition at Point Barrow, August. There will be about thirty men, forty sailors, including a number of South Sea Islanders. The captain will make his first stop at Petropavlovsk, proceeding thence to the east coast of Siberia.

GONG WILL ANNOUNCE EXPOSITION OPENING

THE ringing of a gigantic gong, whose metallic tones can be heard many blocks, will be intermingled with screaming whistles and other noise-making devices Saturday at noon when the Panama-California International Exposition will be declared open by President G. A. Davidson.

Manager Fred A. Bennett of the Western Union Telegraph Company offered to install the gong yesterday. It will be connected with the direct wire from Washington over which will come the signal from President Wilson to open the Fair. Immediately after the president has touched the button, the sound of the bell will be heard within several blocks surrounding the Exposition grounds.

President Wilson was invited to open the Exposition several days ago, but no answer has yet been received. Arrangements for the direct wire from Washington to San Diego have been completed, however, and it is believed that if the president is too busy at the time, a cabinet officer will do the honors for him.

After coming to the United States he served with distinction in the Mexican war, various Indian wars and in the Civil war.
