

Nations of World Listed for Parts In Reopening of Fair

CITY'S DREAM TO COME TRUE WITH FAIR DEDICATION

All Foreign and Domestic Exhibits Will Be Ready for Inspection Saturday.

Day after tomorrow!

That is the day toward which San Diego has been looking, the big day when the world has been asked to "cast Peace and the Exposition, the day marked in red by thousands in the West, who expect to be present on that former site of San Diego's greatest International Exposition, 1916 Dedication Day promises to be the biggest in the history of San Diego.

The flags of twenty nations will be unfurled from the Exposition flag-staffs. President Woodrow Wilson will touch the button that will sound a gong in the Plaza de Panama, the guns of the fleet will fire a noon-day salute, thousands will cheer the national flag as it is raised in the Plaza de Panama and Exposition guests, and when "Miss San Diego 1916" surrounded by the young girls of the service, raises the Stars and Stripes, it will heralded broadcast that San Diego again invites the world to visit.

Participation is set. The thousands of participants are ready, and when the curtain rises it will present the most beautiful Exposition ever built in California. Canada is ready. The great exhibit, conceded to be the most wonderful assembled, will be open for ten days. The French government is ready, and from every branch of the service, raises the Stars and Stripes, it will heralded broadcast that San Diego again invites the world to visit.

Germany, Austria, Italy, Brazil and Russia are ready, as well as the other great civilized countries, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Spain, Portugal, Persia, India, Japan, and the Pan-Pacific countries, and the United States government exhibit is housed in three entire buildings, and is one of the most attractive ever presented at any Exposition. It includes 16,000 square feet of floor space and a new building has been built for the aquarium at the head of the Isthmus.

At noon, President Woodrow Wilson will press a button in the White House, ringing a great gong in the Exposition grounds; salutes will be fired by the warships present and by the batteries at the Exposition; the flags of eighteen nations will be unfurled from flag-staffs; Miss San Diego will raise the Stars and Stripes on the Plaza; the salute to the strains of the "Star Spangled Banner" and the Panama-California International Exposition will be officially opened. Count Del Valle, governor of the State, will raise the Spanish flag sent by King Alfonso to President Davidson at 12:10 p. m. following, which addresses will be made by the Honorable Juan Williams, Governor

FRENCH EXHIBIT AT FAIR OPENED

visited San Diego as to report on the matter to their government. Friendship Emphasized. "I want to say that from the French commissioners we received the heartiest of co-operation from the San Diego Exposition officials, and the most anxious waiting followed and on New Year's Day we were advised that the French government had followed the program of its commissioners and that our request was to be granted.

"In sending this great exhibit here the French government has shown that the spirit of staunch friendship for Americans has grown and expanded since the time of Lafayette.

"On behalf of the Panama-California International Exposition, the city of San Diego and the state of California, I wish to extend thanks to your interest in our exhibit. We ask that you carry this sentiment to your government and to the people of France."

MacKinnon Speaks. "President Davidson, Consul General of France, Fellow Citizens:

"The participation of the French government in our International Exposition, notwithstanding the gigantic struggle in which the French people are engaged, is but another evidence of the friendly ties which now exist, and from the inception of our government have drawn us so closely together the peoples of the two greatest democracies on earth—the Republic of France and that of the United States of America. "No American has ever studied early history of this country, and especially our struggle for independence, and found in the very words of George Washington, the president of George III, and his reactionary ministers, without a profound feeling of gratitude in his heart for the timely aid and assistance rendered to us by the liberty-loving citizens of France. At the time of the establishment of our government, the common enemies of the two civilizations, we were indebted to the great French philosophers of the eighteenth century for a new conception of the dignity of man, for political emancipation, for social equality, for the abolition of caste and privilege, and for the idea of the fraternity of all peoples."

Recalls Webster's Words. "The dashy figure of that noble Frenchman, Lafayette, in his unselfish devotion to the American cause, symbolizes to the American mind, the generous impulses and the noble spirit of the French nation. At the laying of the cornerstone of Bunker Hill monument, June 17, 1793, Daniel Webster, at the age of 17, pointed to the revolutionary veterans who stood near him and addressed Lafayette in the following words: "These men who have survived that day and whose lives have been prolonged to the present hour are now around you. Some of them you have known in the trying scenes of the war. They raise their trembling voices to invoke the blessing of God on you and yours forever. Illustrious are your merits, yet far, oh, how far distant, be the day when any inscription shall pen your name or any tongue pronounce its eulogy."

"This ceremony took place over ninety years ago, yet is there any doubt in the mind of anyone within the sound of my voice that the American people have forgotten or ever will forget this noble-hearted Frenchman, who not only gave his fortune to feed, clothe and equip our soldiers, but with his compatriots, was baptized in fire and risked his life in defense of our freedom and independence."

Obligations to France. "As a potent factor in our successful revolution against tyranny and for the rights of man, we shall always hold the Republic of France in grateful remembrance. As a nation we admire their democratic principles, their simplicity of life, their bravery of temperament, their joy of living, and the events of the last year, and a half have banished forever from our minds the lingering doubts as to their sterling qualities of patience, fortitude and endurance."

"Without expressing any partisan view and without any discussion of the cause of the war, which side is right or wrong, I believe I express the sentiment of this entire audience when I say that soldiers of France make the wonderful generosity of their beloved Joffre in her gallant and heroic defense against a valiant foe, have not only surprised but have inspired with the spender and admiration of the world. The grand open air ball, led by Miss San Diego, will take place in the Plaza at 8 p. m. At the same time a number of entertaining features will be staged on the isthmus. The carnival festivities, including serpentine, band music, entertainments, noise making and dancing will begin on the isthmus at 8 p. m. and will continue until past midnight.

ISTHMUS, SPICK AND SPAN, TO HAVE BIG PART IN DEDICATION

"Greatest Shows on Earth" Line Both Sides of Joy Street; Get Your Ice Skates Ready for Indoor Rink; Music and Gaity on Program.

Spick and span, resplendent in color, and full of thrilling attractions, the new Isthmus will be the rendezvous for joy-seekers when the 1916 Exposition is formally dedicated, Saturday. From early morn until after midnight there will be contests, musical performances, Spanish singing and dancing, coon shouting, and a thousand other free attractions to fill the hearts of young and old with joy.

"While a brass band is dispensing popular music at one end of the Isthmus, F. G. Kauffman's Exposition animals will be performing marvelous antics at the other end; Russian dancers will dance, a colored troupe will show how the old plantation songs should be sung and from a veiled balcony of the Hawaiian village the fair daughters of Honolulu will serenade with fascinating native music."

The entrance at the entrance to the amusement street will be thirty-two degrees on Saturday, for the largest ice-rink on the Pacific coast, in the old Alhambra, cafeteria is expected to open to the public on this day. From the cold atmosphere of the skating rink one can advance to the beach, where only the Hawaiian village, taking a whirl on the monster carousel before entering the tropics; a visit to the City of Jerusalem; the Panama canal, complete in record and overhauled, will be open.

Grizely Gulch will be all dolled up and ready for the cowboy and tenderfoot; Captain Sigby's educated horse will exhibit human intelligence and Madame Ellis will demonstrate her mind-reading powers; the alligators from Croft's "Alligator Farm" will receive an early call, and be ready for the festivities of the day; a visit to the Painted Desert and one will have completed one side of the Isthmus. Standing up the other side one can see the Exposition zoo, containing some of the best wild animals in captivity. A hike up the Isthmus on a splendid auto can be indulged in by the young and old; Robinson's Animal Show, containing the finest trained animals of the Pacific coast, and a visit to the Isthmus performances; the "Sultan's Harem" will be worth seeing before undertaking a trip through the "Underworld" of the Isthmus. The "Roadshow" is necessary to make the Isthmus tour complete. From the depths of the "Gem Mine" one can see the "Lucky Seven" and himself in the "Oriental Joy Garden"; from here one can step into the Latin Quarters of Paris after a visit to the "Fountain of Youth" and life for a game of automatic baseball or skeeball. After some ice cream one will feel like seeing "Cleopatra at the Bath" and the nude "Mafaldetta," both master paintings of the artist's line that made "Stella" famous. With a visit to the "War of the World" one will have covered the main attractions on the Isthmus.

E. is larger, it was the Exposition of an already grown city, yours is more intimate more exquisite. It is the Exposition of a town still to grow up, but in the United States the towns grow up quickly. There is much to be in San Diego of a future full of promises. I hope your Exposition will be for your town the beginning of a new era of prosperity and in a few years it has become one of the most important cities of the west coast, one of the pearls of the Pacific and you remember that the Exposition was the starting point of that prosperity. They will be proud that you can say: 'France was there.'
