According to Exposition officials, no formal action has been taken regarding a post-Exposition period extending until April 1.

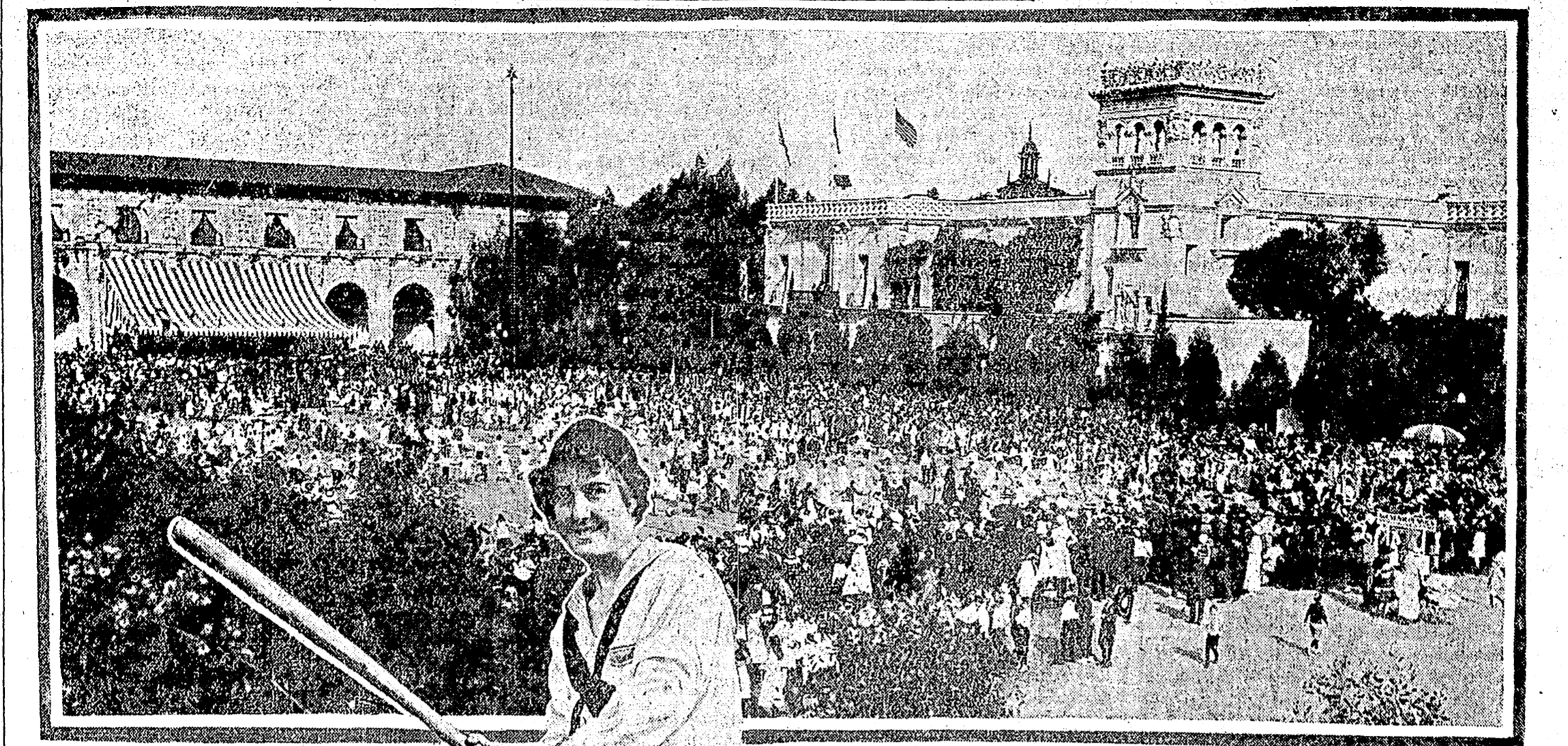
The Exposition closes January 1," said Carl I. Ferris, member of the executive committee of the Exposition and assistant to the president yesterday.
